CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE COMBAT NARRATIVE MAY 1945

During the month of May 1945 the 89th Bombardment Squadron (L) conducted a total of 21 combat missions including 187 combat sorties. 123 tons of bombs were dropped (including 22 M-10 Napalm wing tanks), 12.9 tons of bombs were returned, 0.9 tons were salvoed and 184,475 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended in strafing. (1) This is a decrease from April 1945 of 14 missions but an increase of 5 sorties. The reason for the difference is that nearly all the May missions were conducted by 9 planes while in April most of the missions were flown by 3 or 6 planes. 10 missions were flown to the Cagayan Valley, 5 to the Ipo Dam vicinity, 4 to the Infanta area, and 2 to Legaspi.

At the beginning of May 1945 the Squadron had 8 A-20Gs and 4 A-20Hs. The Squadron received 2 A-20Gs and 1 A-20H through transfer so by the end of May the strength in airplanes was 10 A-20Gs and 5 A-20Hs or a total of 15 A-20s. The Squadron flew a total of 728:30 combat hours or a total of 863 hours during the month of May. (2)

The first rission of the month for the 89th Squadron was to support ground operations in the Mt. Isarog area, Luzon on 1 May 1945. Cakum assigned the target and an L-4 marked target with white smoke. The 9 planes made 3 single plane passes, dropped 36 x 250 lb. parademos, 14 x 250 lb demos and 4 1-10 Napalm wing tanks and expended 13,700 x 50 caliber ammunition in strafing. Several grass fires were started and one shack left burning. All planes returned safely. (3)

On 3 May the 89th Squadron gave ground support in the Legaspi area, Luzon. Nine A-20s of this Squadron attacked the assigned target which was marked with white smoke from Oakum. Two single plane passes were made and 33 x 250 1b parademos, 16 x 250 1h demos and 2 1-10 Napalm filled tanks were dropped. The target area was thoroughly strafed with 10,900 x 50 caliber ammunition. Nil damage was observed. Propaganda leaflets were dropped over the target. All planes returned safely to base. (4)

For a ground support mission in the Laguna de Bay vicinity on 4 May, the 89th Squadron furnished 9 A-20s. The ground coordinator marked the target, a hill 1000 yards NE of Salangbato, with white smoke. All planes attacked the target, made two single plane passes and dropped 2 M-10 Napalm filled tanks, 36 x 250 lb parademos and 14 x 250 lb demos. One shack was destroyed and 3 small fires were started. A m/g position was silenced with 10,900 x 50 caliber ammunition. One plane was holed by ack-ack in the left engine nacelle. Propaganda was dropped over the target. A cylinder of photographs for the infantry was dropped over their headquarters. Outlive stated that the photographs were safely received and that the bombing was excellent. All planes returned safely. (5)

On the 5th of May, the P9th Squadron was again called on to give ground support in the Infanta area. All nine planes reached the target, Catablingan town, 2 miles NW of Infanta, dropped 4 M-10 Napalm filled tanks, 6 x 250 lb. demos and 35 x 250 lb parademos. The target was thoroughly strafed with 13,300 x 50 caliber ammunition. Approximately 5 shacks were destroyed and town was left smoking. Propaganda was dropped over target. One a/p was holed by ack-ack. All planes returned safely to base. (6)

On 7 May the 89th Squadron was again called on for ground support in the Norzagaray area. The ground coordinator, Argus III, assigned the target 1½ miles due east of Norzagaray and marked it with white smoke. Two bombing and strafing runs were made from north to south and 28 x 250 lb. parademos, 10 x 250 lb demos and 4 -- 10 Napalm filled wing tanks hit the assigned target. The area was thoroughly strafed with 11,150 x 50 caliber ammunition. Several small grass fires were started. Nil other results were observed. All planes returned safely to base. (7)

During the afternoon of May 8th, the 89th Squadron furnished 9 A-20s for ground support in the Infanta area. The ground coordinator could not be reached so the Squadron attacked the target as was originally briefed. 35 x 250 lb parademos, 14 x 250 lb demos and 4 M-10 Napalm filled tanks were dropped on the target. Only one pass was made due to the difficult terrain. One shack received a direct hit other results were unobserved. Nil ack-ack was encountered. Propaganda was dropped over the target. All planes returned safely to base. (8)

During the morning of May 9th the 89th Squadron gave support to the ground forces in the Ipo Dam area. Nine of the Squadrons planes participated on the mission. The ground coordinator Paddie marked the exact target, 700 yards SW of Ipo Dam, in white smoke. The 9 planes made 2 single plane passes and dropped 36 x 250 lb parademos and 18 x 250 lb demos. The entire area was well strafed. There was nil observed damage from bombing or strafing due to the rugged terrain and dense foliage. Meager, light accurate to inaccurate ack-ack from unknown position holed one plane. There was nil injury to personnel. Paddie reported bombing as excellent. All planes returned safely to base. (9)

On the 11th Of May the 89th Squadron was called on to neutralize a road block 3000 yards SW of Binangonan Pt in the Infanta area. After contacting the ground coordinator, and learning that it was clear to bomb, the 9 planes made 2 single plane passes, bombing and strafing. 34 x 250 1b parademos and 18 x 250 1b demos were dropped on the target. Only grass fires were observed other damage being hidden by speed and foliage. Meager, light to moderate inaccurate ack-ack from target area. Mil planes holed. Propaganda was dropped over target. All planes returned safely to base. (10)

During the morning of 13 May the 89th Squadron, along with 3 other squadrons of the group, hit a Jap bivouac and supply area 1 mile east of Lal-Lo, northern Luzon. All 9 planes bombed the target as one 3 plane abreast pass was made. This squadron bombed 36 x 250 lb parademos, 18 x 250 lb demos and expended 7800 x 50 caliber ammunition in strafing. Visible results showed 3 grass shacks destroyed. Other damage could not be assessed. There was nil ack-ack encountered. Propaganda was dropped over the target. All planes returned safely to base. (11)

On 15 May 9 planes took off to give ground support to Mt. Purro, Luzon but due to unfavorable weather were unable to reach the target. (12)

An afternoon strike on the 17th of May took this Squadron to the Marikina Watershed Reservation vicinity to give ground support. The Squadron contacted Trophy and was ordered to attack from west to east with nil strafing. Trophy then marked the target with white smoke and the planes made 2 single plane passes. 64 x 100 lb demos and 17 x 250 lb demos fell on the target. There were nil observed results from bombing. One plane received a jagged hole in the nose from a probable bomb fragment or land mine. There were nil personnel injuries. All planes returned safely to base. (13)

The mission for 18 May was for 9 planes to give ground support to the Marikina Watershed vicinity. All planes reached the target and contacted Trophy 1 who marked the target with white smoke and gave instructions to bomb from south to north and not to strafe. 40 x 100 1b parademos, 10 x 250 1b demos, 8 x 100 1b demos and 4 M-10 Napalm tanks were dropped on the target at coordinates 055778, Mt. Irid Map 1:50,000 345511. All bombs were seen to land on the target ridge with nil observed results. Propaganda leaflets were dropped and all planes returned safely. (14)

During m d afternoon on 19 May the 89th Squadron took off to give ground support in the Ipo Dam area. In the target vicinity the Squadron leader contacted Coyote and received instructions to bomb only and make run from W to E. Coyote then had the target marked with white smoke. The 9 planes made 2 single plane passes on the heading as ordered. 104 x 100 lb demos were strung out over the target. There were nil observed results but Coyote reported excellent coverage. Propaganda was dropped over the target. All planes returned safely to base. (15)

On 20 May, the 89th Squadron attacked a Jap bivouac area along the Ganano river just N of Santiago village, north central Luzon. As briefed, the target was free and nil contact had to be made with a ground coordinator. Eight planes attacked the target in a coordinated 3 plane pass. 487 x 23 lb. parafrags were spread over the target and 6,700 x 50 caliber ammunition was expended in strafing. Several huts received directhits and near misses starting 4 small fires. Nil ack-ack was encountered and propaganda was dropped over the target. One plane returned early with engine trouble. All planes landed safely at base. (16)

On the morning of 21 May, the 89th Squadron, one of four squadrons, attacked a Jap bivouac area from Buntun to Bagay, in the Tuguegaro vicinity, northern Luzon. A ground coordinator, Nephew 4 was contacted and clearance was given to attack the target. The 89th followed the 13th Squadron, made one 3 plane abreast pass to the NE and dropped 22 x 250 lb demos starting 3 fires, destroying 2 shacks. The area was well strafed with 7,500 x 50 caliber ammunition. Nil ack-ack was encountered. Propaganda was dropped over the target. All planes landed safely at base. (17)

On the 22nd of May, the 89th Squadron was the lead of 4 squadrons participating on the mission. The target was a Jap bivouac area 3000 yards due N of Balete Pass and due east of Santa Fe. All nine planes reached the target and made the attack. The pilots toggled their bombs on those of the B-25 escort. Bombing was carried out from 10,000 feet altitude. All bombs were reported in the target area with nil observed results. Small arms fire, probably m/g, holed one plane in the fuselage. All planes returned safely to base. (18)

On the 23rd of May the 89th, second of two squadrons making the attack, had a Jap troop concentration in Paniqui village, central Luzon as their target. The 89th was second over the target with 8 planes bombing and strafing the target. 600 x 23 lb. parafrags and 13,100 x 50 caliber ammunition was expended on the target. Two single plane passes and one 3 plane abreast pass was made. After the 3rd attack there were 30 to 40 well burning fires in the area. Grey smoke covered the area to 3000 feet altitude. Inaccurate small arms fire was received from the target area. No planes were holed. Propaganda was dropped over the target. All planes returned safely to base. (19)

The 89th Squadrons mission for the 24th of May was an attack on a Jap troop concentration in Larion village, 2000 yards NE of Tuguegarao. The 89th was the lead of two squadrons making the attack. Arriving in the target area the squadron leader contacted the ground coordinator, received clearance and attacked the target as briefed. The bombing and strafing passes were made from SW to NE. 544 x 23 lb. parafrags rained down on the target and 11,900 x 50 caliber ammunition was expended in strafing. Approximately eighty five percent of bombs landed in the target area. An estimated 20 to 30 shacks were blazed. One secondary explosion with black smoke to 3000 feet was seen in the target area. Meager, light and possible medium ack-ack from the target area holed one plane. There was nil injury to personnel. Propaganda was dropped over target. All planes returned safely to base. (20)

Combat Narrative, May 1945, Cont'd.

The target for the Squadron on 26 May was to attack Lantap village, northwest of Bagabag in central Luzon, in coordination with two other squadrons of the Group. The target could not be located so all planes returned to home base. (21)

A Jap bivouac area at the north edge of Santiago village, Luzon was the target on 27 May. 9 planes reached the target dropping 664 x 23 lb. parafrags along both sides of the river just north of Santiago. 4 to 5 fires were started in shacks and 1 black smoke fire was started about ½ mile north of the river. The entire target was well strafed with 13,450 x 50 caliber ammunition. All planes returned safely although 1 plane was holed in the fuselage. (22)

On 28 May the Squadron was to attack Bolog in north central Luzon or the secondary target at Cambung in northern Luzon. Bolog was not attacked because of unfavorable weather over the mountainous terrain. Therefore 9 planes attacked the secondary target stringing out 610 x 23 lb. parafrags from 1 to 3 miles east of Lel-Lo town. 2 or 3 shacks were damaged but nil other damage could be assessed due to dense smoke and wooded terrain. All planes strafed the entire area from Lal-Lo town to 3 miles east of Lal-Lo with 13,800 x 50 caliber ammunition. (23)

On 30 May the target was a Jap troop concentration 6000 yards northwest of Jones (in the Cagayan Valley) at coordinates 615085, Jones Map, 1:50,000 3660IV. 9 planes dropped 75 x 100 lb. free falling demos on the target starting approximately 10 fires and destroying 6 shacks. Dense gray smoke covered the target and rose to 1000 feet. (24)

The last mission of the month was flown on 31 May to a Jap troop concentration at Cumao village in northern Luzon. The 89th Squadron led this very successful Group mission. 9 planes dropped 90 x 100 lb free falling demos definitely destroying 6 or 7 buildings and starting 8 fires in the town, one of which gave off a bright flame with gray smoke rising to 3000 feet. The northern two thirds of the village was completely covered by bombs. 10,600 x 50 caliber ammunition was expended in strafing the target. News sheets were dropped to friendly forces west of the Capayan giver. (25)

- 26 May. Behind Captain Vorel's good pitching we beat the 8th Squadron 5-2. Captain Vorel helped his own game by hitting a home run with a man on base in the fifth inning. Captain MacArthur hit a long triple and single. The team hit well with nine hits and played a good defensive game.
- 28 May. In one of the best games of the season the 89th beat the strongest team they have met so far so far this season. They beat the 91st Quartermaster Co. team 5-2. The colored boys put up a terrific battle but had to succomb to Gossett's brilliant two-hit pitching. Heffernan hit a tremendous home run. Wilkinson had two hits and made a spectacular catch of a line drive to left center field in the last immning to save the game.
- 30 May. By getting off to a bad start in the early innings, the 89th was nosed out 6-5 by the 417th Group Officers. Very loose fielding and poor pitching allowed the 417th team to score six runs in the first three innings. The 89th couldn't get started until the sixth inning when they scored three runs and two more in the seventh inning to almost tie the score.
- 31 May. The 3rd Bomb Group Softball league was opened tonight and the 89th won its first game from the 13th Squadron 3-0. A new man, Andruzis, pitched a four-hit shut out while the team hit well and fielded faultlessly.

There has been considerable activity in the Officers area during the past month as they have been working industriously to fashion an officers club for social functions and periodic get-togethers. Under the leadership of Capt. Hughmanick every officer has put in a few hours every day to bring the club to completion. The best feature of the club is the deluxe bar which was the tail of a P-38. At the ends of the bar, where the booms connect in the tail, large "Grim Reapers" have been inserted in oval glass frames. The stools and settees are made of bamboo and the sides are of palm leaf. The club has been named Mindy's and the name will be set out front in foot-high wooden letters. The club is nearly complete and the dedication should take place soon.

Every morning about eight o'clock one sees the officers and enlisted men of the Squadron toddling off with schoolbooks and pencils. Schooldays are here again for pilots, gunners, engineers, and armament personnel of this squadron as factory representatives from Douglas have set up a school to teach the workings of the A-26 airplane. Pilots are learning all about instruments, control surfaces, and performance of the plane. Engineers are learning about all the gadgets, machinery, engines, and mechanical appurtenances, while gunners and armorers are learning about the guns, the turrets and the safety devices. Though the squadron hasn't A-26 planes yet, this comprehensive course is to get all ready for early arrival of the new planes.

Parched throats were finally relieved this month when after long abstinence, two beer issues were made to personnel of this squadron. Since there hadn't been a beer issue in two months, all the boys welcomed this issue and throughly enjoyed a good drink of American beer.

LOCAL INTEREST AND PERSONALITIES

LOCAL INTEREST

- Old man weather was a formidable opponent to the softball team raining out many games during the month. The Squadron won eleven games and lost only two during the month of May. This brings the season's record to 25 won and 6 lost. The team has enthusiastic support by members of the squadron who follow the team wherever they go to cheer them on.
- 1 May. The 89th Squadron beat Group Headquarters Detachment 8-5 by some good slugging. Heffernan hit a trememdous home run with two men on in the fourth inning to clinch the game.
- 6 May. Behind the effective pitching of Hughes the 89th beat the Group Officers All Stars 6-3. Pardee and cluff hit well to drive in most of the runs. Capt. MacArthur hit a home run for the Officers.
- 18 May. Group Headquarters Enlisted Men felt once again the sting of 89th bats when the 89th slugged out a 7-1 victory. Heffernan and Sakosky were the chief sluggers for the 89th. Heffernan and Sakosky hit a triple and single and double and single respectively.
- 21 May. Once again our junx team bettered the 89th for the third straight time. The 90th Sq. won 2-0. Though Hughes pitched a good game, loose fielding and weak hitting lost the game. Three errors in the fifth inning by the infield accounted for the 90th runs. Each team collected three hits.
- 22 May. In another outstanding performance Gossett pitched his second shutout allowing only 5 hits in beating the Eighth Sq. 1-0. Heffernan hit a home run with two outs in the last inning to win the ball game.
- 23 May. Gossett again performed brilliantly today as he allowed one hit as the 89th beat Group Officers All Stars 2-1. The team gathered seven hits as Sakosky and Faber drove in the two runs, Errors scored the only run for the Officers.
- 24 May. The 89th beat the 13th Squadron 6-2. The team did some good hitting in collecting nine hits. Hughes was wild but effective as he allowed only two hits. Sakosky and Cluff got two hits each. Infield fielded very effectively.
- 25 May. In one of the most thrilling games of the season, the 89th came from behind twice to beat Group Enlisted Men 5-4. The 89th made seven hits while Group collected four hits. Our new Mess Sergeant, Sgt. Henry Davis, has set about cleaning up the mess hall and making it more attractive. A new food counter, covered with aluminum, was built. It's a big improvement as it doesn't divide the kitchen in half and allows one to use another entrance. One wall is quite showy as it decoratively displays twelve lovely girls for every month of the year. Large parachutes have been strung up on the ceiling and smaller parachutes draped along the walls at the ceiling giving the whole mess hall the appearance of a banquet hall. We have acquired a new refrigerator which is a boon for keeping our meats chilled and cooling our drinks.

The Baker-Wade team (we fix everything) has been terminated by illness. While on spotting missions with an L-5 in the Legaspi area, Lt. Baker came down with pneumonia and was restricted to the hospital for a few days. One day after his return to the Squadron Lt. Baker fell sick again and went to the hospital once more. He has since been evacuated to Layte because of lung trouble. Lt. Wade after working in the sun all day, was stricken that evening and taken to the hospital. He too had been evacuated to Leyte because of excessive combat fatigue. These two officers will be sorely missed as they did much work on improvements around the squadron and were always fixing something.

CAPTAIN ADMAND LANCTIN

An interesting story of a man behind the flying men is the story of Captain dward Partin of New Pritain, Connecticut. In civilian life after being graduated from Tale Ledical School, Doctor Partin married attractive Puriel Brown of Mockville and Was for 15 months a resident physician at New Britain General Rospital.

Now in the army, Doc Eartin, as he is known of pilots and gunners, is a Flight Surgeon of the famous 3rd attack Group, the oldest fighting team of the Fifth Air Force. After arriving overseas in Movember 1983, Captain Partin requested transfer from a Service Group to a tactical outfit. In due time after encountering many bombing raids at Lae, Finscha en, and Moemfoor, the orders of transfer came through and Captain Eartin Joined the 3rd attack Group.

However, more interesting than where Doc has been is the story of his every-day activities. Like all doctor, you will find Doc Partin with his sick calls each morning, but he is at his best when ie's away from the dispensary and being just one of the boys. Doc's real job is one of watching, watching his fliers for signs of ratioue, nervousness, irritability and a dozen and one other symptoms. To a civilian with such symptoms, Doc would probably recommend that he take it easy or have a nice long rest. However, in dealing with gilots it's much more serious. A splitting headache, nervousness or lack of coordination can be the difference between returning and not returning from a mission.

Joe Fartin is looked upon as one of the boys, he is well liked and a good wixer. However, during that bridge game, drink at the club or at the ball mane in the field, he is watching the boys,—thy does Joe seem low in spirit, and how about Jon,—thy does he misjudge the ball so often? "I'll have to match them more closely".

To further his knowledge of the flying men, so has gone on several missions with the boys. We knows that ack-ack can do to a man and on ground support hissions for which this Group is famous, he knows what tree top level means at 300 mph. We also knows how a split second means the difference between life or death.

The picture on the following page shows "Joc" Captain wartin as he is seen every day, sweating the planes off and watchin them land. The boys know he's there and they feel a lot cetter about it.



89th Squadron Combat Operations of May 1945.



SUBJECT: Air Support of 511th Farachute Infantry by 3rd Somb Group, APC 321.

- Commanding Officer, 3rd, Somb Group (Thru Channels)
- 1. This regiment recently crushed the last organized resistance in Southern Luzon. The operation involved cracking the Fuji Heidan Line in the Mt. Malepunyo Hill Mass.
- Since your Group rendered air support for the operation and you are unable to see the result of your bombing on the ground and know little of its effectiveness, I am taking this opportunity to inform you of the results.
- 3. During the period 2k 28 April your group bembed Hills 2380, 2090, 2k18 and 2610 in the Lt. Lalepunyo Hill Lass. These Hills were the backbone of the Fuji Heidan Line. Owing to the bare percipitous slopes and strength of the enemy who had deep caves and personnel shelters in tunnels as much as one hundred feet back into the mountains, no assault could be made without first neutralizing the enemy and his positions. The air strike closed many caves and tunnels and demolished the prepared positions. Our troops, following your bombing so closely that the concussion caused bloody noses among the men, occupied each hill without opposition. On each objective the Japs were found dazed and killed by concussion and the remnants were easily annihilated.
- 4. Our success was due to the excellent support rendered by your Group. On behalf of the men and officers of this regiment, I wish to extend our appreciation. We hope that such support will be forthcoming in Japan in the near future.
